The President Speaks

First, this being the January issue of our APCO Bulletin for this new year of 1950, I want to extend my best wishes to each member of APCO for a Happy and Productive New Year—productive not only to the individuals and their departments, but for APCO itself.

It seems only fitting that production should be the keynote of this year, for if we are to continue to hold our position, be recognized as truly representative of all police agencies, we must produce the membership to verify this claim. We must produce a more active, closer knit Association, which may be achieved only by more active Chapter meetings, and nationally through a larger *Bulletin*; all of which may be achieved only through increased membership.

I, therefore, appoint YOU a committee of one to bring at least one new member into APCO during this year. I know that many members have employees in their departments who are not members, who would be glad to join if properly approached and the benefits of the Association pointed out to them. Still others of you know of technicians and supervisors, who, if notified by Chapter Secretaries or members, would be very pleased to attend Chapter meetings and join the Association. Our present membership is approximately 1200, which is indeed a small percentage of the persons who work in police communications in the United States.

I should like to point out that production PRODUCES production, for increased membership will benefit you as individuals, your departments, your Chapter and APCO. In a group such as ours we have too little contact with our officers, between members and between Chapters, which, of course, is largely due to the geographical separation of the individual departments and members. New members should certainly serve to decrease the geograppical separation of members thereby forging a closer link of communication between members in the same areas. Increased Chapter membership will enable smaller

Chapters to obtain a quorum for meetings at more frequent intervals, which certainly makes for a better organization for your benefit. Increased activity of all members makes for a stronger organization nationally with increased circulation of the APCO Bulletin - the national mouthpiece. It is hardly necessary to point out that the Bulletin exists for your benefit and that increased circulation will bring forth a larger and better Bulletin by attracting additional advertising and new ideas and contributions. The sole purpose of our Association is to promote improved communications through the promulgation and dissemination of new ideas!

I realize that the above facts which I have pointed out to you are not new or original, but are intended to remind you that you have a definite place and part in the National Association, that you as an individual can contribute in many ways, that you have a voice in the national organization which may be heard by every member by simply expressing your ideas to our National Bulletin Editor, and last, that you have an important duty as a committee member to bring a new member into the Association during this coming year.

To all department heads, I send a reminder that now is the time to start making up your budget for this coming fiscal year. Don't forget to mention the Cleveland Conference as an item of traveling expense which is a must. Be sure that your department is represented. Cleveland being a very central location, and with every member working for the production of a larger membership, we should have the largest turnout in the history of the Association. Let's all produce!

PETITION FOR RULES CHANGE

Regular meeting of the C.P.R.A. was held December 8, 1949 at Santa Barbara in the dining room of the Lobero Hotel.

Meeting was called to order by President Crowder and as the first order of business he turned the meeting over to our host, Mr. Brittian, who introduced several officers of the Santa Barbara Police Department, who extended a warm welcome and also expressed regret that it was raining, but further added that such a remark bordered on treason, inasmuch as the City of Santa Barbara is in a desperate situation as to its water supply.

A letter from the FCC was read, concerning our resolution sent to them relative to the licensing of portables as such. Motion was made by Whitman that we make a formal petition to change the rules by presenting our case with the

necessary 14 copies to the FCC. Motion carried.

As president of the Frequency Committee, Crowder presented the case of the Frequency Release Report of Riverside and the reasons that caused his committee to reject this proposal. A motion was made and subsequently changed about five times, to the effect that Crowder should notify Riverside in writing of the decision and to also advise the FCC of all reasons for the above action. Motion carried.

The long standing request of La Mesa for a frequency was finally disposed of by granting them a frequency of 159.15 with a proviso that this frequency should first be tested and approved by any established service that might be affected.

Bill Durham presented the new Code Book with explanations of changes. Several methods of financing the publication were presented. A motion was made and carried that this matter be left up to the Committee for any method suitable to them and which would not encumber the organization.

Clearances for the following were received and granted: Holtville, 155.25, Tulare Co. (repeater) 73.38. San Diego, 39.18.

A suitable frequency for San Bernardino County, which now wishes to


