FIFTY 800 MHZ CHANNELS SET ASIDE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY

On November 6, 1980, the Commission in a historic decision, recognized the priority nature of the Public Safety Radio Services. The Commissioners adopted Docket 79-191 which set aside 50 800 MHz channels exclusively for use by governmental entities in a trunked or conventional mode.

Recognition of the special needs of tax-supported communications systems and their funding requirements has been an objective of APCO for many years. By adopting Docket 79-191, the FCC has formally recognized the difference between public and private communications systems. This is a major achievement for APCO.
